I love the prophets, Micah especially. There is a sense of vulnerability and timelessness to their words. In this passage, Micah writes from a place of exileâ€"God's people are broken and scattered, Jerusalem is destroyed, and the people grieve what has been lost, and yearn for a return to normal. Does this sound familiar? As the coronavirus scatters and destroys our human family, we too grieve what has been lost: family members, friends, and the ways we used to go about our daily lives. The grief is real and it hurts. And like the Israelites, we too long for a return to normal, where we can eat and laugh and be together, like we did in the before time.

But friends, the truth is that normal is not returning. This virus is not going away any time soon, and has already fundamentally changed so much of how we do life. The outbreak of the virus has also exposed the many inequities and injustices of our old normalâ€"racism, wealth inequality, and unequal access to healthcare, to name a few. These are problems that are bone deep, problems that will ruin us if left unaddressed.

Now, with this dismal picture I've just painted, it's fair to ask, "Well, what's the point then?! What sort of future are we waiting for?" To that question, I would encourage us to hear the good news: we are waiting for something new. We live in a complex and broken worldâ€"a world not unlike the one Jesus came into, and spoke into, and loved into. Jesus looked into that world that was so different and yet so similar to ours, with all of its violence and injustice and brokenness, and he imagined something new. That something was the Kingdom of God. So friends, as we wait in this advent season for the coming of the Kingdom, let us lower the mountains and make straight the crooked places for the new thing Jesus has planned.

Prayer

God, help us wait patiently and expectantly for your coming kingdom and the newness you desire in us and for us. Open our eyes to the holy changes you are bringing about in our lives and in our world and make us willing partners in your new creation. Amen.

God's Shocking Expectation

Acts 11:1-18

If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?

Before Peter's visit and vision in Joppa, the apostles and other Jewish believers shared the message of Jesus Christ with Jews only. They now were astounded to hear that God intended that they share it with even the Gentiles!

Some words stand the test of time--words such as "all" and "everyone." Both these words were spoken in his first Pentecost sermon by Peter (see Acts 2:17 and 21). This is in preparation for understanding the meaning of Peter's dream which is our focus for today's devotional--ALL PEOPLE AND EVERYONE who hears the message.

The message was not meant for a privileged few or even just a special group.

Members of the church in Judea thought otherwise. It was rumored Peter ate with those who were uncircumcised, outside the club, unorthodox and definitely defined as "the other."

Peter's vision challenged this kind of thinking, first to Peter, then to the others. "It is not for you to call profane what God counts clean" (v. 9). Plainly said, God doesn't make junk!

It was a significant teaching then and is a sharp reminder for us today. "The Other," whether of another gender, color, belief, orientation, (dare I say) party, is valued, loved, treasured by the One God who created us all clean.

Prayer

God of all, as we prepare our minds, hearts and homes to celebrate the birth of Jesus, the Christ, may we not hinder you in sharing the gift of belief and acceptance within your Kingdom. In celebration of your great love, may unity, peace, and respect for all prevail. By the power of the Holy Spirit, may we all recognize each other as your children. Amen.

Softening Our Hearts

Malachi 3:1 Luke 1:5-17

With the spirit and power of Elijah he will go before him, to turn the hearts of parents to their children, and the disobedient to the wisdom of the righteous, to make ready a people prepared for the Lord."

In today's reading, Luke describes the circumstances under which John the Baptist was born. The story may sound familiar. The husband Zechariah is old and his wife Elizabeth is barren. But through prayer and their faithfulness, the angel Gabriel brings great news. "Do not be afraid"; "your prayer has been heard"; "your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son" (Luke 1:13). There are parallels here to Abraham and Sarah's late-in-life birth of Isaac (Genesis 17) and to Jesus' own birth announcement to Joseph (Matthew 1). These are further examples of the many preparations God had done before Christ came into the world. Along with many other prophesies, the messenger was presented for humanities' benefit.

But Gabriel's declaration of what will happen in John's life is most interesting. In Luke 1:17: "With the spirit and power of Elijah he (John the Baptist) will go before him (Jesus Christ), to turn the hearts of parents to their children‹." This softening of hearts is done, by God and through John, for our preparation of receiving Christ.

Can you think of examples of God hardening hearts? Pharaoh's heart was hardened, for God's purposes, to "multiply God's signs and wonders in the land of Egypt" (Exodus 7:3). How about examples of God softening hearts? In Ezekiel 11 and again in 36, God promises to remove the "heart of stone" and give the people a heart of flesh (softening).

And thankfully, God continues this work in us today.

Lord, thank You for Your willingness to turn our hearts from stone to a heart of repentance, ready to accept Christ anew. Amen.

The Christmas Dolly

When my daughters were younger, new dolls were always at the top of their Christmas wish lists. One year in particular, I had picked out a new doll for my youngest daughter, who was about 5 years old, from a specialty doll store - it was a doll unlike any other we had. It was made to resemble a newborn baby, and came in an oddly shaped box - almost a hexagon shape. As I had never actually taken my youngest to this specialty doll store, I knew for certain there was no way she would know what was in the box.

In our family, wrapped gifts are placed under the Christmas tree all throughout the days and weeks leading up to Christmas, and my daughters frequently poked around the tree, keeping track of what new items appeared. Imagine my surprise, when my youngest daughter looked straight at the package I had placed under the tree and announced to everyone that the box contained her new dolly. Struggling to keep a nonchalant look on my face, I assured her it could be just about anything and she would have to wait until Christmas morning to find out for certain. Catching on to the idea - her older sisters immediately chimed in with what else could have been in the box besides a doll. Yet everywhere we went, and everyone we saw, friends and family alike, my youngest daughter told everyone about the new doll under the Christmas tree in the box with her name on it.

When Christmas morning finally arrived, and we gathered around the Christmas tree to open gifts, my youngest picked up the box, calmly unwrapped it, and then pulled the doll from the box to show me, "See?" she said, "I told you it was my new doll".

Here was my five-year-old, showing me what having a child-like faith was all about.

In the story of Elisha, from 2 Kings 2:9-14, before Elijah had been taken up in a whirlwind to heaven, Elisha asked to be given a double portion of Elijah's spirit. Elijah responded that what Elisha had asked for was difficult. Yet after Elijah was gone, Elisha picked up the cloak that Elijah had dropped, fully trusting of God's promise and expecting God to show up in a big way. He struck the river with the cloak and parted the waters of the river Jordan to the left and to the right, and he crossed over on dry ground.

As adults, having that child-like faith is much harder. Having expectations of God seems like risky business at times. We know that God is good, we know that He loves us and plans for good things in our lives. But sometimes, it's hard. What if we could simply believe - like we did as children - and expect that God would show up in our lives in a big way? How would we be different? How might our prayer life be different? How might our hearts change, if we waited expectantly for God to show up in our lives?

The Day of the Lord

Malachi 3:16 - 4:6

Behold, I am going to send you Elijah the prophet before the coming of the great and terrible day of the Lord.

Hebrews 1:1-4

"The Son is the radiance of God's glory and the exact representation of his being, sustaining all things by his powerful word. After he had provided purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty in heaven." (NIV)

Apprehension, uncertainty, anxiety-- all these emotions churned in my heart and mind as I entered the school building for the first time since March with the intention of preparing for the new school year. How would I manage doing things that have never been done before?

As I cleared out old materials as well as new-but-never-used, thoughts flooded my mind. I wondered if my previous students would be successful after only half a year's instruction. I fretted about how to do my job with so few answers and so little direction. I worried about failing, failing my colleagues who I knew would be looking to me, and failing my students as I floundered along one day at a time. It was hard to let go of the past 6 months to focus on the upcoming year, and just as difficult to look to the future with any sense of hope or certainty.

After Jesus returned to Heaven, Jewish Christians struggled to let go of the past, of the comfort of what was "known" in Judaic laws. But Hebrews reminds us that Jesus is God's Son, that he is the exact image of God, and that God IS the law. We do not need to fear the unknown, or be anxious of what is to come. God's power is supreme and he upholds the universe by the power of his word. God's words are promises to his people and those promises sustain us through all things. Jesus's birth, crucifixion, and resurrection fulfilled his promise of redemption, of mercy and grace from sin, and when we accept him into our hearts, we are transformed into new beings with new understanding.

When I sat down with my calendar to begin planning the first few days of activities, my apprehension and anxiety fled in the wake of rising excitement—excitement at the new possibilities before me, of NOT doing the same thing I've always done before. I held my breath, and

took the plunge into a year of complete unknowns that no one could have anticipated, but secure in God's promise to sustain me.

As we celebrate this Advent season, experiencing the joyful anticipation of Jesus coming into the world, fulfilling your greatest promise to your people, let us also remember anew your promise to uphold us and guide us. Help us open our hearts to new beginnings and look to the future with security.

And tomorrow night, we celebrate a related divine surprise: God gave up God's power to become enfleshed in the person of Jesus of Nazareth, a poor, brown, vulnerable refugee, subject to the cruelties of this world.

God surprised us then and surprises us todayâ€"and for that we cry out Hosanna, Glory Be! We are invited to rejoice with the crowds at Christ's coming presence in our lives in ways that are wonderfully unexpected.

God of happy surprises: When things do not go according to plan, may we have grace for ourselves and may Your grace raise us to new life. And may we notice and rejoice in the surprising birth of Christ in the lowly stable two thousand years ago and in the unexpected places of our lives today. Amen.

The holy night is here! For what do you rejoice and give God praise this holiday season?

Walk in the Light

John 12:35-36

The concept of light and darkness runs from the earliest verses in Genesis all the way to the conclusion of the Book of Revelation.
